CIRCLE OF 2 DAY INTENSIVE TRAINING SECURITY

THE CIRCLE OF SECURITY® IS BOTH A “USER-FRIENDLY” VERSION OF ATTACHMENT THEORY, AND A SET OF EVIDENCE-BASED ATTACHMENT INTERVENTION PROTOCOLS FOR PARENTS AND CHILDREN ACROSS A RANGE OF AGES.

The interventions can be conducted in group or family sessions, and use a standardised sequence of steps involving review of videotaped interactions between the caregivers and their children. The goals of the intervention are to help caregivers better understand their children’s attachment and exploration patterns, to make more compassionate and accurate inferences about their children’s experiences and motivations, and to enhance their children’s secure attachments by more sensitively reading and responding to the children’s cues and miscues.

The workshop

- Through extensive use of graphics and videotapes, Day 1 will focus on the “user-friendly” version of attachment theory –a version that is easier to comprehend than the traditional theory, while at the same time maintaining fidelity to that theory.
- Day 2 will focus on the intervention protocols, again making extensive use of video-tapes.
- Completion of this workshop will provide participants with many ideas for improving their work with, and care of, children and parents in both low- and high-risk populations.
- Completion of this workshop will also provide participants with the background necessary, should they wish, to begin formal training and certification in the Circle of Security intervention protocols.

Learning objectives

Participants will gain in-depth knowledge of:

- attachment theory applied to children from ages 1-12 years
- ways to use simple but powerful graphics and video clips to help caregivers better understand their children’s relationship needs
- the sequence of steps, exercises, and psychotherapeutic strategies, involved in conducting the Circle of Security Intervention.

Robert S. Marvin, Ph.D.

Director, The Mary D. Ainsworth Child-Parent Attachment Clinic & Department of Psychology, The University of Virginia

Dr. Marvin was an undergraduate student and research associate with Mary D. Ainsworth at Johns Hopkins University. He received his Ph.D. in developmental and clinical psychology from the University of Chicago in 1972. After completing a postdoctoral fellowship at the Institute of Child Development, University of Minnesota he began teaching at the University of Virginia, where he is currently Professor Emeritus in the School of Medicine and Research Professor in the Department of Psychology. He is also the founder and director of the Mary D. Ainsworth Child-Parent Attachment Clinic in Charlottesville, Virginia. Throughout his career, Bob has been active in basic and clinical attachment research, and research with families who have children with chronic medical conditions and/or histories of problematic or disrupted early relationships. With a variety of colleagues, he has developed and tested numerous attachment-related procedures that are used in basic and clinical research, and in clinical practice. He has written and co-authored many articles and chapters on this work, and is on the editorial board of *Attachment & Human Development*.

Over the years, this work has led Bob to focus increasingly on clinical issues, including assessment and intervention with families experiencing divorce, and with children in the Child Protective Services, foster care and adoption systems. With Glen Cooper, Kent Hoffman, and Bert Powell, Bob has been active in developing and testing the Circle of Security intervention protocol. Currently, he is especially active in using the Circle of Security framework in developing community-based partnerships among professionals, with the goal of making the rather specialised theories and procedures used in attachment research available in a practical form to community-based therapists and other professionals working with these high-risk families.

Bob travels extensively to train professionals in implementing science-based practices that integrate developmental psychology, clinical psychology, and family systems work. He enjoys sailing, travelling, his five grandchildren, and especially spending time with his wife and best playmate, Cherri.
