Who is this course for?

This course will be of special relevance to those working directly with very young children ideally 0 - 1 year and their families. It is aimed at a variety of disciplines including Community child health Services (Midwives & Health Visitors), Social Work, Child Mental Health, Paediatrics, Educational and Clinical Psychology and Early Years Sector Education.

Rationale

The importance of early years, and the quality of the relationship between young children and their caregivers for infant mental health and child development, is widely documented. However, the ability to observe and assess this relationship has been identified as a key learning need by the Infant Mental Health Project. (Supported by the National Programme for Improving Mental Health and Wellbeing 2007)

This course was designed in response to an identified need for increased observation and assessment skills.

Aims:

- To contribute to the continued profession development of front line staff working with children and families.
- To increase skills in the assessment of parenting, with particular reference to the emotional quality of the parent-infant interaction.

- To increase observational skills and enable a more informed assessment of parent and young child relationships, linking observation with child development theory and research.

Specifically the practitioner will develop skills in the use of detailed observation as a tool for understanding infants and young childrens' behaviour.
